John Martin's " Destruction of Pompeii and Herculaneum " (1821) On August 25, 79 AD, Roman author, naturalist and natural philosopher Pliny the Elder died, while attempting the rescue by ship of a friend and his family from the eruption of Mount Vesuvius that had just destroyed the cities of Pompeii and Herculaneum.

On February 5, 62 A.D. a powerful earthquake, about 7.5 in magnitude occurred, with the epicenter at Pompeii.. The Latin philosopher and dramatist Seneca the Younger wrote a description of the event: This tremor was on 5 February, in the consulship of Regulus and Verginius, and it inflicted great devastation on Campania...Sheep died and statues split.

The destruction of Pompeii happened in "A.D.", which stands for Anno Domini, which is Latin for "year of our Lord". Sometimes you may hear "B.C.E.", and that stands for "before the common era". It means the same things as "B.C.", but it takes religion out of it.

The first deaths in Pompeii were recorded at this stage as the flat roofs of buildings and houses began to collapse under the weight of the ash and volcanic debris, crushing those unfortunate souls who dwelled within their walls. Rocks falling from the sky claimed the lives of others.

A few years after the event, Pliny wrote a friend, Cornelius Tacitus, describing the happenings of late August 79 AD when the eruption of Vesuvius obliterated Pompeii, killed his Uncle and almost destroyed his family. At the time, Pliny was eighteen and living at his Uncle's villa in the town of Misenum.
